As a student of law at Prague's Charles University, I fell in love with the American *Declaration of Independence*. This was during the era of the Stalinist regime in the former communist Czechoslovakia, in the early 1960's. I found two propositions in the *Declaration* particularly earth-shaking:

- all men are created equal,
- legitimate government cannot exist without the consent of the governed.

The Land of Liberty

These two principles heralded (to me) the ultimate end of totalitarian communism, and made me see that not all governments are oppressive and corrupt. I decided to leave the country of my birth and go to study in the U.S, in spite of the fact that it was one of those things which were nearly impossible to do for a citizen of communist Czechoslovakia.

Nevertheless, Someone (undoubtedly) was watching over me. After about two years of relentless bureaucratic battles, I

was allowed to leave Czechoslovakia for Norway to finish my Charles University doctoral dissertation on the institution of "the Ombudsman in Scandinavia."

From the University of Oslo, I was able to leave, after a year in Norway for the U.S. (by way of Cambridge University in England). I attended Columbia University's Graduate School of International and Public Affairs in New York.

An important question

After I had graduated with my Master's degree in International Affairs in 1975, and had gained my American citizenship (just two centuries after founding of the Republic) in 1977, the time came to ask myself an important question:

"How am I progressing, along with my fellow Americans, toward the fulfillment of the original American mission, which was to demonstrate the capacity of free men to govern themselves, to protect and extend personal liberties, and to achieve equality of opportunity for all men and women?"

Answering that question helped me to better understand where I needed to focus to find my place in American society. Living in New York City, I saw many people unable to find a suitable employment, being severely underemployed, or facing all kinds of prejudices in the hiring process. All these problems were preventing these people from reaching their full human potential. How could I first solve these problems for myself, and then for others?
